

HEADQUARTERS 727TH AMPHIBIAN TRACTOR BATTALION

15 August 1944

26 January 1944; 727th Amphibian Tractor Battalion activated with 15 Officers and 140 enlisted men. Commanding Officer Major McLavy, Executive Officer Capt Russell, S-1 Lt Melgard S-3 Lt. Lucas, S-4 Lt. McKullen. S-2 Lt. Van Eck. CO Co. A. Lt. Cushing Co. B. Lt. Garfinkle, C O Co. C. Lt. Barr, C O HQ Co. Lt. McQuade, other Co Officers, Lt. Osuri, Lt. Prendergast, Lt. Wellen, Lt. McGowan, Lt. McLeish, Lt. Zakowsky, Most of the men and Officers came from the 534th and the 773rd ATB's. The Major came from the Armored School at Fort Knox. The Bn Area is located in East Garrison Fort Ord, about 500 yds from Hq 18th Armored Group. Men lived 5 men to a hut. Officers 2 to a smaller hut. Quarters and food good. Morale fair due to the transferring and changing and previous inactivity.

4 February 1944; The following Co Officers assigned and joined. Lt. Carter, Lt. Durrell, Lt. Lerner, Lt. Wright, Lt. Blake, Lt. Majorassy, Lt. Vestal, Lt. Rothenberger, Lt. Bierer, Lt. Corbin, Lt. Noble.

7th. Lt. Durrell appointed S-2 Lt. Van Eck relieved. WO1G Pawlowski relieved as Motor Officer, Lt Wright appointed. Lt Majorassy appointed Bn Gas Officer. Lt Melgard in addition to other duties is Bn Mail O.

9 February 1944; 18 Enlisted men transferred to 776 A.T.B.

10 February 1944; Capt. Russel appointed Summary Court and investigating Officer.

12 February 1944; Capt. Burnham appointed S-2, Lt Durrell rel'd.

13 February 1944; 96 Enlisted men assigned to the Battalion.

14 February 1944; Lt. Longendorf and Lt. May assigned and joined

16 February 1944; Lt. Durrell appointed Bn Gas Officer, Lt Haferossy relieved and transferred. Lt. Griswold assigned S-3 Fort Knox, Lt. Jamison assigned to Bn. Lt Lerner transferred. Lt. Noble and Lt. Van Huss, Lt. Vestal and Lt. Wellan are Motor Officers.

18 February 1944; Capt. G. W. Bragdon assigned. Capt Baker assigned and appointed Bn. Motor Officer. Lt. Wright relieved.

26 February 1944; Lt. Raymond A. Schaefer, Lt. Charles Hlin, Lt. Harold C. Hayden assigned.

29 February 1944; Lt. Acuffie promoted to 1st Lt.

31 February 1944; During the month of February, individual training was emphasized along with some POM requirements, and the Battalion began slipping into shape. We were in need of more men.

to take care of our own and Group details. The 16th Armored Group was commanded by Colonel Triplett and his Executive Lt. Colonel Northridge. The function of Group was to coordinate the Battalions and other post agencies. Another phase of training during this period was maintenance of the few vehicles we had, setting up a Battalion Maintenance section. Mr. Pawlowski assisted Lt. Wright and the deadline was high at first because of our low priority in the Group. Wheeled Vehicles kept near Battalion area. Tractors at Beach Motor Park, 10 miles from Battalion area.

1 March 1944; Lt. McQuade appointed CO Co. C, Lt. Barr relieved. Lt. Sakowsky appointed Communications Officer, Lt. McQuade relieved.

4 March 1944; Lt. Cs Uri transferred.

14 March 1944; 46 E M assigned. Seemed to be good material.

18 March 1944; 23 EM assigned. More of the same quality.

19 and 20 March 1944; 54 EM assigned.

22 March 1944; Lt. Schafer assigned and joined as CO Co B vice Lt. Garfinkle relieved.

23 March 1944; WO1G McClain assigned. Go Beer parties.

24 March 1944; Lt. McClain assigned.

25 March 1944; Lt. Donahue assigned.—

27 March 1944; Lt. Sykes assigned. Capt. Baker to D. S. Lt. Wright reappointed En. Motor Officer.

31 March 1944; 31 Enlisted men assigned. The month of March was similar to that of February, in that all training had to be repeated for each group of new men assigned. The long 10 mile trip to the beach motor park has proved to be a time and gasoline waster. We still spend a great deal of time and effort for group details. The supply section is functioning almost normally. The company Officers are working night and day to keep up with the training schedule.

4 April 1944; 70 enlisted men assigned and joined.

5 April 1944; Lt. Spilman assigned. Capt. Baker transferred.

8 April 1944; The Battalion moved from East Garrison to Main Garrison at the 8th St and 3rd Ave Barracks excellent. Four miles nearer the Beach Motor Park. Area confined but satisfactory. Rumors prevalent about overseas movement. No definite information as yet.

10 April 1944; Capt. Mahurin assigned as C C Co. A. Lt. Cushing relieved.

11 April 1944; 46 Enlisted Men assigned. Br nearly at P O strength. Overstrength in officers.

15 April 1944; Capt. Keim assigned as CO Co. C Lt. McGuade relieved. Capt. Bragdon assigned as CO HQ Co. Lt. Rothenberger relieved. Capt Varricchione assigned as Executive Officer, Capt. Russel relieved and appointed S-5. Lt. Lucas relieved. Lt. McGuade appointed En Communication Officer, Lt. Sokowski relieved. Lt. Wellan appointed Bn Maint Officer. Lt. Wright relieved. Lt. Francis X Smith assigned.

26 April 1944; WO1G Pawlowski promoted to C W O.

29 April 1944; St. McGowan transferred. During April the BOY was very nearly completed. The Bn participated in several Group problems, which emphasized formation driving and using azimuth course. The Major decided we would emphasize those points in our training. Frequently Group sent inspectors to check every angle of our Bn. They found few discrepancies and made the most of them. Then we would go all out for maintenance, police or gun cleaning, which ever seemed indicated. The tractor men are shaping up well. The Battalion is looking like a combat team.

3 May 1944; Capt. Williamson assigned as Bn Medical Officer.

8 May 1944; Lt. Gush assigned Commanding Co. A. Capt Burnham transferred. Capt Russell appointed S-2. Capt Verrichionne S-3. Capt Mahurin appointed Executive Officer.

10 May 1944; Lt. Sakowsky transferred.

13 May 1944; Lt. Longendorf transferred.

15 May 1944; Lts Spilman and Lerner transferred.

19 May 1944; Official orders received that we move to Camp Stoneman.

20 May 1944; Officers party at Tass a Hare, a resort, and hot springs in the mountains 50 miles south. The road was very bad and when we arrived the caretaker informed us that the facilities could not be used. Most returned to Capt. Mahurins house and had a chicken fry.

22 May 1944; Following Officers transferred. Lt. Noble, Lt. Van E Eck, Lt. van huss, Lt. Jamison, Lt. Bierer, Lt. Vestal, Lt. Ray, Lt. Prendergast, Lt. Lucas.

27 May 1944; Lt. McMullen left on advance detail to Fort Mason S F P E I.

30 Ma 1944; Liaison Officer Capt. Russell left for Camp Stoneman. Personnel anxious to leave. A good percentage of the men had furloughs this month.

2 June 1944; Left Fort Ord at 1930 by train and arrived at Camp Stoneman 1600 for staging. Stayed in Section K. Chow excellent, good USO shows and Movies. PK in area. Barracks satisfactory, men slept double decked. ] P

Plenty of recreation. Emphasis on Physical conditioning and finishing up and stray ECM requirements. WAC organization in area this Battalions first association with WACs.

10 June 1944; Battalion Officers dance at West Garrison Club.

14 June 1944; Lt. Wellan promoted to 1st Lt.

15 June 1944; Advance detachment left Stoneman by truck at 1800, arrived at Oakland Pier at 1115. Main body left Camp Stoneman at 1215, marched 2½ miles to Pittsburg and took Catlinia to Oakland Pier, arriving at 1830. Boarded USAT Willard A Holbrook at 1900.

16 July 1944; Disembarked into LCT at 1000, landed at Tjeweri Beach, Humboldt Bay at 1230.

26 July 1944 Lt. Donanue transferred to 1881 E A B.

31 July 1944; Pay day. Picture shows regularly.

Subsequent to debarkation, men are having period of acclimatization, consisting of frequent rest and swimming periods. The time spent on the ship was one of rest and relaxation, altho quarters were cramped. Men were permitted on deck, where they read, played cards and slept. Most were glad to leave the USAT Willard A Holbrook after the prolonged voyage of one month.

5 August 1944; Camp on Tjeweri beach is pretty well set up. Men have used imagination in fixing their pyramidal tents. Officers sleep in small wall tents. Water is transported some distance, but is plentiful. Food is good. The scenery beautiful and life rather leisurely.

6 August 1944; Church services are held regularly several times per week.

7 August 1944; Cards for ballot request were passed out to all men. Few take advantage of the opportunity. They don't know the candidates.

8 August 1944; Men are enthused over the excellent European war news.

6 August 1944; Our tractors arrived. One sank after unloading into the water, leaving us 39.

14 August 1944; Breaking in of tractors has begun. We are pleased with the fine operation of the M-4.

17 August 1944; The projector the men purchased has more than compensated for the cost. It is working very well and pictures are shown tri weekly.

- 17 August 1944; A reconnaissance was made of a possible new area at Tami Beach, at present only occupied by 34th Inf.
- 18 August 1944; Co "B" Moved to new area.
- 19 August 1944; Hq Co Moved to new area.
- 21 August 1944; 60 new tractors arrived for the Bn, making a total of 100, one of which sank during unloading.
- 22-25 August 1944; Tractors being unloaded and driven to this area.
- 24 August 1944; Advance detail to Aitape for purpose of instructing Tractor units of Infantry Div.
- 25 August 1944; Main detail to Aitape.
- 28 August 1944; Co "A" moved to this area.
- 31 August 1944; The month of August consisted of getting settled, moving, getting settled, furnishing details and unloading tractors and preparing to begin training. Men can now move with neatness and dispatch.
- 2 September 1944; The first issue of the Bn Newspaper "Trac Talk" was published and seemed well received by the men, it is to be published every Saturday.
- 4 September 1944; This unit is providing instructors for infantry drivers and maint men who have LVT's attached to their organization.
- 6 September 1944; Crew of LVT rescued personnel from C-47 downed in breakers. T/Sgt Walker, Pfc Bova, and Pvt Sapp, were the crew.
- 9 September 1944; Second issue of Trac Talk published. Training in full swing.
- 11 September 1944; New area more satisfactory than old. Grading still proceeding but nearly finished. Bitting gnats found annoying, shirts must be worn.
- 12 September 1944; Possibility of one Co. being used in task force in near future.
